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As evidenced by the pollen blanket on cars all over Mobile, spring has sprung! For most in our city, spring means warmer weather, sunnier days, pollen, and flowers. For the folks here at Housing First, there are a couple of additions to that list; they also add funding announcements, and Point in Time Count numbers.

The Point in Time Count is a nationwide count that is organized and delivered in the last two weeks of every January. This task is handled by each community in different ways. In Mobile and Baldwin Counties, the count is orchestrated over two days and using two distinctly different events.

The Point in Time Count and Project Homeless Connect are stand-alone events that happen within the same 24 hours. During that time, they have both a more traditional street count in which volunteers and staff canvas the streets and wooded areas as well as counting those persons who are obtaining shelter in a transitional housing or emergency shelter site.

While this is a proven method to count the homeless persons in the community, Housing First knew that they were missing people. There are a number of reasons why this was the case, but one of the biggest was the fact that Mobile and Baldwin Counties have both urban, coastal, rural, and suburban areas. This means that a one size fits all approach to this count was not going to capture all of the persons that they need to reach out to.

Thus, Project Homeless Connect was born. PHC is a one day event fair that is held at the Grounds, who sponsors the event. Many community agencies come together to provide services that a person or family experiencing homelessness would need. These services range from Dental and health services all the way to consultation with a lawyer and a hearing right there on premises. People are able to obtain a haircut, have their dogs see a veterinarian, and obtain much needed bike repairs. As you can imagine, this event takes all year to plan and involves many different service providers working in tandem. This project allows Housing First to count those persons who they might never find, but who are experiencing homelessness and should be represented and offered services.

In 2015 the Point In Time number for all persons counted in Mobile and Baldwin Counties was 640 total persons. Housing First is pleased to announce that the numbers for 2016 have continued the downward trend to 628 persons counted total this year.

The 2016 Azalea Trail Run started with a boom on Saturday, March 19, and it was not just the starting gun. The Mobile County Health Department used the event to "Declare War on Physical Inactivity."

Dr. Bernard H. Eichold II, Health Officer of the MCHD, was the honorary starter for the 10-kilometer race. Before the runners took to the streets of Downtown Mobile, he thanked all the participants — including several health department staff members

and Board of Health chairman Dr. Nina Ford Johnson — for doing their part by getting exercise and helping to fight obesity.

"Childhood obesity is an epidemic in America," Dr. Eichold said. "Today is a great example of what we can do to help wage war on physical inactivity."

To emphasize his point, Dr. Eichold later fired a Civil Warreplica cannon to begin the 10K race. Kelly Warren, Director of MCHD's Prevention & Wellness Bureau, did the honors for the 5-kilometer race. The cannon was provided by Claude and Michelle Turberville.

"This is the 200th anniversary of our health department, and we are ready to fight the Battle of the Bulge 2016," said Ms. Warren, who was a participant in the 2-kilometer Fun Run with her family. "We encourage everyone to get out and enjoy the beautiful surroundings we call home."

As for the need to exercise, Ms. Warren pointed to the 2016 County Health Rankings released by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation last week. For overall Health Outcomes, Mobile County ranked 40th out of the state's 67 counties.

One section of the rankings studied Physical Inactivity, which was listed as the percentage of adults ages 20 and more who reported no leisure-time physical activity. Mobile County (30%) trailed both the state average (29%) and top U.S. performers (20%).

For Adult Obesity, Mobile County (36%) again was behind the state average (34%) and top U.S. performers (25%). To see the complete listing, visit www.CountyHealthRankings.org. •

The ACCC is a collegiate athletic conference that is part of the (NJCAA) National Junior College Athletic Association and located in Region XXII. There are 18 members of the conference which is comprised of more than 80 individual teams with more than 1,600 student athletes. Shelwood is the Head Men's Basketball Coach for Bishop State Community College and has a long history of working with basketball teams in Mobile, AL. He has served as a men's basketball coach at Bishop State for 23 years. Prior to that time, he was the basketball coach for the boys at John L. Leflore High School where he led the team to state championships.

Coach Shelwood continues his history of producing top notch players. Chance Morton of Bishop State Community College's Basketball Team was named the Player of the Year by the ACCC for 2015-2016. Morton was also named the ACCC Player of the Week for the week of February 15-21. The Mobile, AL native currently ranks 4th overall in the ACCC for scoring per game and first in rebounds. ZIKA ALERT

With warm weather on the horizon, we are all looking forward to the return of... mosquitoes. Unfortunately, this summer the CDC anticipates them bringing the Zika virus along with them, particularly in the southern coastal regions of the country like Mobile.

But don't fret. For most people, the virus won't be a big deal. You may not even notice if you happen to be infected by it. The symptoms are mild. Body aches, a low-grade fever, a headache, pink eye, or perhaps a mild rash for a few days.

Zika is a big deal for women who are pregnant or planning to become pregnant though. Having the virus during pregnancy is associated with a birth defect called microcephaly. Microcephaly is a condition in which the brain and skull of an infant does not form properly and in addition to the baby's head being abnormally small, he or she may have a variety of developmental challenges.

Zika can be transmitted by being bitten by a mosquito with the virus, or by having unprotected sex with a man who has the virus. Right now, there is no vaccine or treatment for the virus, so our only option is to try to prevent its spread by avoiding mosquito bites.

MEN, if you and your wife are trying to have a baby, you also need to diligently protect vourself from mosquito bites to protect your wife and child from infection. If your wife is already pregnant, you will need to use condoms or abstain from sex until after the birth of the child. NO exceptions!

2016 MOBILE SPORTS HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

Two Major League Baseball stars - one with speed to burn and the other a top scout - a Division I championship quarterback, a former PGA tour player, an All-American volleyball player, and one of the greatest high school basketball coaches in Alabama history make up the 2016 class of the Mobile Sports Hall of Fame.

"Once again Mobile's great sports history is represented by an incredibly accomplished and diverse class of athletes," said Peter Albrecht, MSHF President. "This year the Hall welcomes its first volleyball player, as well as basketball, baseball, football, and golf greats."

JIMMY GREEN: Played at Alba High School in Bayou La Batre, before going on to become a three-time SEC and All-American selection at Auburn. He captured the conference's individual championship in 1991 and collectively won six collegiate events during his time on The Plains, more than any golfer in school history. Green went on to play in 128

"Top 10" finishes. He grew up on his hometown Driftwood Golf Course, where his father was the pro.

LANCE JOHNSON: An MLB All-Star (1996), Johnson played for five big league teams between 1987-2000. He is the only MLB player to lead both leagues in hits, and is one of three players in MLB history to lead both leagues in triples. From 1991 through 1994, Johnson led the American League in triples, becoming the first player in Major League history to lead his league in triples for four consecutive years. A native of Cincinnati, Ohio, Johnson settled in Mobile after attending the University of South Alabama

where he led the nation in steals and was a Second Team All American selection. His mercurial speed

on the base paths during his MLB career, and his uniform number "1", earned him the nickname

"One Dog," which was also the name of the record company he owned during his playing days. TEE MARTIN: An All-State quarterback and punter at Williamson High School, Martin attended the University of Tennessee where he backed up Peyton Manning for two seasons before leading the Volunteers to a National Championship in 1998. In 1999, Martin was an All-SEC pick before going on to spend two years with the Pittsburgh Steelers and one with the Oakland Raiders, as well as later continuing his professional career in NFL Europe and the Canadian Football League. Martin has been an assistant coach at the University of New Mexico and Kentucky, but is now the offensive coordinator at the Univer-

J.D. SHELWOOD: Won over 400 games as head basketball coach at LeFlore High School, including two state titles (1986 and 1989). After becoming the Rattlers' man in charge in 1966 he went on to compile a 447-239 won-loss record. His teams team made 10 state tournament appearances, and he was named "Mobile County Coach of the Year" an amazing nine times, while also being tabbed Alabama Coach of the Year in 1986 and 1989. He is currently head coach at Bishop State Community College in Mobile.

MONIQUE ADAMS-WILLIAMS: Twice a collegiate All-American, Adams led LSU to three SEC Championships and two Final Fours. She was a two-time all league selection, was the 1991 SEC Tournament MVP, and made a Final Four All-Tournament team member. After being selected to the USA National Team (1989-1991), Adams played professional volleyball overseas for 17 years (1992-2008), including 10 years in Italy. At McGill-Toolen, she led the Dirty Dozen to four 6A state championships. Adams was also an All-State basketball player and led the Yellow Jackets to an undefeated state championship season. She is now an assistant coach at Bayside Academy in Daphne. &

The Street We Love to Hate



If you've been in Mobile for any length of time, chances are you've experienced the street we all love to hate – Airport Boulevard and its infamous traffic. Since most of my articles have focused on downtown Mobile and the inner city, I thought I'd turn my attention to west Mobile and share my thoughts on ways to alleviate the congestion and delays we all encounter when we travel down Airport Boulevard.

I feel that one of the main problems with traffic on Airport Boulevard is the two-way service roads that line the thoroughfare from Sage Avenue to Azalea Road. But before I delve into that, let me back up and say that another big reason that there is so much congestion on Airport is that most of the city's retail establishments and restaurants can be found along Airport. This has started to change in the last several years as Government Boulevard, Dauphin, Schillinger and other main thoroughfares now are gaining businesses that once could only be found on Airport.

My suggestion for the portion with the service roads is to make them one-directional instead of the two-way mess we have now. If you've waited in traffic at Airport and Montlimar Drive, you will understand what I mean. Each direction of Airport has a turn signal and a main signal, each service road on both sides have both signals and the Montlimar and Yester Oaks Drive both have both signals. So, that is eight light-changing sequences that has to occur before the lane you're in can go again. I haven't timed it but I'm willing to bet that it takes at least 2 to 3 minutes to cycle through each sequence depending on whether you're on the main road or on the service roads or cross streets. In traffic time, two minutes seems like an eternity.

Making the service roads one directional would eliminate some of the left turns from the service roads as the service road traffic could merge onto Airport via the existing entry cuts. Another option, If designed properly and if enough room is available, would use the service roads exclusively to make both left and right turns onto the cross streets. This option would take some time getting used to it but it is used in other places around the country.

The other suggestion, which is more costly and will take more time to implement, is to build flyovers (overpasses) at key intersections such as Montlimar Blvd, Azalea Road/McGregor Avenue, University Blvd, Hillcrest Road and Schillinger Road. These are the intersections that need it the most. Service roads could be added in the areas where they don't exist to allow local traffic access to businesses along the way. If you've traveled on Memorial Parkway (US 231) in Huntsville or on the freeways in many Texas cities, you will see how beneficial the overpasses and one-directional service roads are to allowing the main traffic to flow smoothly and quickly.

So, the next time you're traveling on Airport Boulevard, just think about how much better it could be if the overpasses existed and the service roads only have one-directional traffic. Then you'd have to find other congested streets to hate such as Springhill Avenue in Crichton or Dauphin Street near Sage Avenue during rush hour.

Have you ever been told, "You're not listening to me?" and you reply that you were. Perhaps you heard them talking but were you truly listening. There's an art to listening. I must admit, I'm guilty of not listening at times. The reason being is my attention was divided. A lot of times my mind is racing with so many different things. At times, my daughter has to bring it to my attention that I wasn't really listening. So I apologize and give her my undivided attention. Perhaps you can stop and evaluate yourself as being a really good listener. Could the television, radio, texting, or a noisy background prevent you from giving your full attention? If so, try turning the television or radio off, put the phone down, or move to a quieter place so that you can clearly pay attention.

Fresh off their New Year's run at Cervantes in Denver, the Chris Robinson Brotherhood breezed into town. The chilly Park City air greeted patrons who stood patiently outside the sold out venue. Park City Live welcomed them all in, with cold beers and whiskey drinks ready for one and all. Utah provides on thing in spades, an appreciative crowd. Drink tabs piled up as cheers erupted from the crowd. Locals and ski vacationers alike were clearly ready to get down.

The band too provided a high level of enthusiasm. Bassist Mark Dutton and drummer Tony Leone could often be seen sharing a look, and a laugh, from the back of the stage. From the candid joyous moments of the deep end to the subtle smirks on Neal Casal

face as the night moved on, it was clear these guys all enjoy their day jobs.

The band's support join in the good times by passing out shirts to me and women deemed to have been boogieing down hard enough. 

In order to better protect the health of local citizens, the Mobile County Health Department's Inspection Services division is working with the Mobile County Revenue Commission to rein in illegal food vendors.

Dr. Stephanie Woods-Crawford, the director of Inspection Services, said her office has received complaints concerning unlicensed Food Service Operations being conducted through social media. According to Chapter 420-3-22, Code of Alabama, Rules of the Alabama State Board of Health for Food Establishment Sanitation, any individual involved with the preparation, dispensing or transportation of food items is required to apply for and obtain an operating permit from the local health department.

Once an offender is identified for performing such operations without a permit, they will be served an Official Notice of Violation to immediately cease operations.

"The Mobile County Health Department intends to initiate any necessary action to ensure that all Food Service Operations are in compliance with local as well as state regulations," Dr. Wood-Crawford said. "By bringing this matter to their attention, we hope to curtail any existing problems with non-permitted Food Service Establishments, as well as protect the public's interest through assuring a safe and wholesome food supply."

It's a frightening thing, to say the least. You have to wonder how one man can incite so much hatred and violence. My daughter and I talked about what things prompted all of this mess.



- 1. KNOW YOU—By understanding your aspirations, experiences, goals, strengths and weaknesses - there is nothing to be nervous about. The interview is a matter of telling your life story in a positive, concise, value point format.
- 2 DO NOT OVER PREPARE—Trying to memorize answers can overburden you. Today's interviews are divided into behavioral and skill questions. Behavioral answers are a matter of consistent, positive delivery. Skill answers are your experiences and production.
- 3. THE RESUME—For your employment campaign you may need a minimum of two resumes: chronological and hybrid (highlights primary and additional skills).
- 4. THE RESUME PACKAGE——Create an Employment History sheet (former company, contact information, beginning and ending dates & compensation, reporting supervisor and a blurb on company; Recommendation Summary, a one line blurb from letters of recommendation. Document three case studies which will review how you overcame adversity, suggested ideas the company adopted or implemented a winning campaign or strategy.
- 5. INTERVIEWER QUESTION—Prepare a minimum of five questions to ask the Interviewer about the company culture, plan and your supervisor expectations.

- 8. BODY LANGUAGE—Perceptions are based on attire, attitude, speech and body language. In less than 60 seconds people will make judgments. Be mindful of body language that says you are disinterested, bored or disrespectful.
- 9. ARTICULATION—Be concise, clear, positive and energetic (not too much hype).
- 10. HOMEWORK—Research the company, position and overall direction.
- 11. BONUS—Clean up your social media content (alcohol, curse words, gossip, sexist comments etc)
