

They are 50+ year members of St. James Major Catholic Church, with Joe serving as the Music Minister for the past 25+ years and Gwen a choir member. The Lewis' have 5 children: Anthony Lewis of Mobile, Robert (Alice) Lewis of Montana, Bryan (Maria) Lewis of Georgia, Clifford (Robin) Lewis of Virginia, and Kimberly (Kieron) Buford of Virginia; 17 grandchildren, 5 great-grandchildren, siblings, cousins and friends.





As I start the second year of writing this column for STEPPIN' OUT, I want to thank the publisher, Greg Cyprian, for the opportunity to express my thoughts on topics related to improving Mobile. I hope that what I've written has prodded you into thinking more about Mobile and the things that can be done to enhance the quality of life in the city. As I've written before, it will take involvement by all facets of the community to improve the city.

On my travels around the country, I try to observe what's happening in those places to determine what make those cities tick. There are often a multitude of things that drive their energy and growth. It's usually a combination of a few big things and a lot of small things that create the synergy that makes many cities great.

We always seem to be in the waiting mode for the next big thing to happen in Mobile. Maybe it's not even the "next" big thing but the "first" big thing. I doubt that a Disney World-type big thing is going to happen anytime soon. We can strive for some lesser big things (if that makes any sense) that will help add to the flavor and growth of Mobile.

Perhaps, it may be comparable to how the Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail, developed by the Retirement System of Alabama (RSA), enhanced tourism in the state of Alabama. In addition to the golf trail, RSA has played a significant role in restoring and developing buildings in Mobile as well as other Alabama cities. Our skyline is populated with buildings that have gotten new life under the auspices of RSA. I feel RSA's investment in downtown has been a big thing. The industrial successes in recent years have been big things, too.

For those who don't believe there's anything happening in downtown and midtown Mobile, here are a few that eventually add up to a big thing as they help change the landscape of the city...

- Two new hotels: Hilton Garden Inn across from Bienville Square and hotel on South Royal Street in Fort Conde
- The renovation of the Buick building on St. Louis Street. Business and Retail
- 951 Government Street Building Residential
- Russell School on S. Broad Street Residential
- Old Shell Road School Residential
- New Federal Courthouse on St. Joseph Street
- Refurbished Admiral Semmes Hotel
- Refurbished Van Antwerp Building
- \bullet GulfQuest Maritime Museum Opening in September

It would be great to have the "next big thing" happen soon in the city. It could be something on the scope of the Urban Village project where the Civic Center stands that I mentioned in my March 2015 article or a broad plan to develop the riverfront that I discussed in the October 2014 article. Share your ideas for the "next big thing" for Mobile and I'll mention them in a future article. ❖

Fare Thee Well-Celebrating 50 Years of GRATEFUL DEAD (CHICAGO • JULY 03-05)

In my five years as a writer/editor for Jams Plus Media, I've written quite a number of reviews, some easier than others; I've got some experience under my belt. But after attending the Fare Thee Well 3-day concert experience in Chicago celebrating 50 years of the Grateful Dead, I was reluctant to write anything. No matter what words I choose, no matter what songs or moments I try to describe, I feel it will not fully do justice to what occurred in Soldier Field July 3-5th 2015, where 70,000 fans gathered to revel in the Music created by one of the most iconic American bands of all time. Having been fortunate to see one Grateful Dead concert in my life (4/7/1995 in Tampa, FL), and then having mourned the loss of the incomparable Jerry Garcia a few months later, it was clear that even if "The Music Never Stopped", it would cer-

tainly never be the same again. When I heard about the 50th Anniversary Fare Thee Well concerts, my first reaction was "That's cool, but I don't really want to go; after all, 'He's Gone', and even though I love Trey Anastasio, it just won't work." Fortunately, my husband Clayton convinced me that if we could score tickets, we should make every effort to go see Mickey Hart, Bill Kreutzmann, Phil Lesh, and Bob Weir one more time, playing the music that changed our lives 20 years ago. Plus, with the talents of Trey Anastasio, Jeff Chimenti, and Bruce Hornsby on board, the lineup was solid, and we should be in for a real good time.

It was my first time in Chicago, and it was amazing to see how welcoming this (continued on next page)

beautiful city was to the Deadhead community descending upon it. The Field Museum had an "Everything is Dead" exhibit which included Tickets-By-Mail envelope art, a rose-crown bedecked dinosaur skull, a variety of memorabilia, and Jerry Garcia's "Tiger" guitar. The hotel lobbies and hallways played Sirius/XM's Grateful Dead channel, while Giordano's delivered their signature deep dish Chicago pizzas in 'Steal Your Face' boxes. Upon entering Solider Field for the first show on July 3rd, we were offered long-stemmed red roses by the staff, as well as full-color program booklets. Large photos of the band members were hung like banners throughout the stadium. An energy of excitement and joy pervaded the crowd as the GA-floor spaces and all levels of the stadium began to fill to capacity. When the band came onstage, the audience erupted in cheer as "Box of Rain" filled the air: how poignant that the



final song played at Jerry Garcia's final show with Grateful Dead at Soldier Field in 1995 became the starting point for our celebration.

Noteworthy highlights from 7/3/15 included: Bob Weir bringing an unexpected "Passenger" into the first set, Bruce Hornsby's piano being turned up nicely on "Crazy Fingers" and "Franklin's Tower", Trey Anastasio being allowed into the driver's seat for "Bertha" and drawing Bob into guitar intensity for "The Music Never Stopped", and the entire second set finding the band firing on all cylinders and sounding fantastic.

One of the best ways to celebrate Independence Day is with the Grateful Dead, and 7/4/15 held magic beyond compare. By now the band was truly finding a comfortably communicative style, especially in "Tennessee Jed". With Anastasio on lead vocals for "Standing On the Moon", I was brought to tears, and the "Lost Sailor > Saint of Circumstance" was phenomenal. This night in particular the Rhythm Devils were on point, as Mickey Hart and Bill Kreutzmann put forth a primal tribe-driving "Drums". During "U.S. Blues" they showed video footage of the Empire State Building in NYC being lit up in synch with the song, and then a fabulous fireworks show ensued to finish the evening with a bang.

For the final show on 7/5/15, the band left it all on the stage, with an absolutely solid first set from beginning to end; for me, hearing Phil Lesh sing a beautiful "Mountains of the Moon" leading into a true Grateful Dead classic jam was top-notch. Not to be outdone, the second set brought intense rock in "Truckin", supreme beauty in "Althea", tear-jerking tenderness in "Days Between", and full crowd involvement for "Not Fade Away". The "Touch of Grey" encore gave us one last nostalgic dose of happiness, and during "Attics" they showed photos of all band members, both past and present, eliciting huge cheers from the crowd.

New Sewer Treatment Plant in South Mobile

With construction of a new sewer treatment plant underway, more than 3,000 residents in the St. Elmo-Irvington area will soon have access to sewer service.

Last month, work began on a \$3.7 million sewer project in St. Elmo-Irvington. It is supported by a grant from the Alabama Department of Environmental Management (ADEM) along with funds provided by the St. Elmo Irvington Water Authority (SEIWA).

"This is a first for us," said Henry Newton, President of SEIWA Board of Directors. "By offering sewer service to the community, we're providing a convenience to our residents and improving the life of St. Elmo-Irvington for years to come."

Plans include a new 30,000 gallon sewer treatment plant to be erected, near the I-10\Exit off Highway 39.

Sewer lines to be placed in the following areas:

- Highway 39 pass the Gibson Road Exit
- Gibson Road to Padgett Switch Road
- Highway 90 East pass Murray Hill Road
- Highway 90 West pass St. Elmo Airport
- Highway 90 South on the Irvington Bayou highway to Half Mile Road
- Highway 39 South down McDonald Road to Highway 90

"This project is an important step in protecting the environment and accommodating future growth, said Mobile County Commission President Jerry Carl, whose district includes St. Elmo-Irvington. "It's definitely a positive incentive to attract new businesses and residents to the area."

The plan will take approximately 9 to 12 months to complete.




Retired Educator Starts New Career

DEAR DISGUSTED,



The question may arise as to why one would keep old journals around the office. "They hold history, the history of CBFH - Serving families since 1928, states Beverly Cooper, CBFH, vice-president. "The tagline is more than a catchy phrase, it's what we do. "We're proud to serve."

Service to others is how Frances Sheard would describe CBFH. "I've known about Christian Benevolent since the 1940's, states Frances Sheard, "My mother had insurance with Christian Benevolent. They have helped my family in our darkest hours and helped the community as well." Sheard further mentions that no matter where her family lives, they all agree that their final resting place will be in Mobile, Alabama and Christian Benevolent will handle the arrangements. "That's just how much we value them and our family wouldn't have it any other way," states Sheard.

CBFH has been a staple of the community, particularly the African-American community for nearly 87 years. In fact, they were one of few businesses in the Mobile area to provide funeral services african-americans, according to Cooper.

As result of performing thousands of funerals over the years, CBFH has accumulated records dating back to the early 1930's. "We constantly receive requests from the public researching their family history, states Cooper. "During those times, records on African -Americans were not considered priority, Cooper said. Because we've been around for years, our service to others have proven to be a resource to the community. "Our records may help someone find answers about their heritage and our services help families find comfort when they need it most."


