CAREER TRAINING Makes an IMPACT for a LIFETIME

Mobile Works launched a marketing campaign reflecting the initiatives of the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) signed into law by President Obama in July 2014. WIOA helps job seekers and employers access employment, training and supportive services to compete in the labor market. Likewise, WIOA mandates workforce boards be comprised largely of employers and business leaders in the community. Their goal is to implement training programs mirroring the needs of the local workforce and leading to career pathways for job seekers.

Although previous employment and training programs (CETA, JTPA, WIA) led to millions of job seekers becoming employable, WIOA provides additional accountability and transparency. Funding dollars and performance indicators will be allocated based solely on job seekers finding employment and a career path in the area of training received.

In fact, WIOA's goal for job seekers can be summed up in two words - Wendell Powell. He's an example of someone who utilized the service of the program and created a career path. Powell, a 2005 graduate of Williamson High School, enrolled at a four year college and quickly discovered the typical college setting was not for him. Working with his hands and fixing things was his passion.

At the urging of his parents Powell inquired about an amazing opportunity at the Alabama Aviation School. He enrolled and received training as an airframe and powerplant technician with funding from Mobile Works. Additionally, he enrolled in MAE's apprenticeship program and received paid on the job training.

Within two years Powell received his associate's degree and became licensed by the Federal Aviation Administration. Fast forward ten years and this airframe and powerplant technician is now a supervisor. "I love my job," Powell said. "I don't have a job. I have a career." Powell has since married and looks forward to a bright future professionally and personally. "I have my dream job and my dream wife. God is good," Powell said.

The Story of The Prichard Mohawks Revisited

HOW JACKIE ROBINSON INSPIRED A COMMUNITY

In March of 1948, Jackie Robinson and the Brooklyn Dodgers came to Mobile on a whistle stop tour to play an unremarkable exhibition game that had remarkable consequences for the city, the black community, and for baseball itself.

Thrilled to see the man who broke major league baseball's color barrier, Robinson's brief appearance fueled a passion for the game among the city's black population. One man, however, saw more than just excitement for a sport. Thirty-year-old Jesse Norwood (whose son would go on to be Mayor of the City of Prichard) saw a way to help the kids who would congregate beyond his stoop, lost and hopeless in the segregated South of the 1950s. Though having no baseball experience at any level, he realized he could take the model of the game and build it into a sense of dignity and pride. In 1957, using only the middle and high school age boys in his immediate neighborhood, Norwood started a baseball organization that within a handful of years would become the envy of every other club playing in the area and would have a profound effect of every person involved with the organization.

Here's to You, Jackie Robinson: the Legend of the Prichard Mohawks is the story of a man who transformed a gang of scrawny youngsters into both a team and a genuine force in the community. Norwood emerges as a figure worthy of legend, and his legacy can still be felt today.

With a novelist's gift for storytelling, Joe Formichella breathes life into a South long gone and creates a hero's story, sometimes heartwarming and sometimes heartbreaking, that begins in a sandlot and ends in the Baseball Hall of Fame.


On April 03, the new re-released story of the "The Prichard Mohawks" was presented at a venue in downtown Mobile.

This story has been inducted in the Negro League of legends Hall of Fame featured on display in the Smithsonian Museum at the Anacostia branch in Washington D.C. and recently featured at the Major League Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, New York.

The new owners of the publishing rights to this story along with the famed author Joe Formichella, have re-branded the look of the book and added some surprises to its original intent which makes it a more enjoyable baseball story.

The event was attended by family and friends of the Mohawks that included a short of evening of food, entertainment and elbow rubbing with the famed Mohawks baseball players.

These Mohawk baseball players are living legends of a story that a book can only begin to tell today. ❖



THE MOHAWKS SIGNIFICANCE IN LOCAL BLACK HISTORY

The book and story tells in greater detail why this community should stop and pay special attention to this story:

- The 75- 50 young men who went through the Mohawks system of personal development, each excelled in their personal and community life.
- Each Mohawk carries a special type of bond for their former team mates today and all have never had any criminal issues in their lives.
- Several Mohawks had opportunities to play big league Baseball but instead choose other routes of success.
- The Mohawks carved out a baseball field with stands/concessions from an old corn field they leased in Trinity Gardens. They maintained the baseball park without public funds and they settled the area with good natured Sunday afternoon Baseball games. Today the City of Mobile has made this a permanent City park called "Trinity Gardens Park".
- The Mohawks played teams from as far away as New Orleans and Tallahassee, FL (The State Prison in Atmore was only one of their many annual road games which drew media (positive) notice.
- The Mohawks were about young Black Male development through (Baseball). Some observers would later say the game was a worthy backdrop to helping young men when they needed it the most.
- In 2007 The Mohawks baseball Club were inducted into the Negro League's Hall of Legions (Booklet & story are on display in the Anaconda branch (Washington D.C. Library of Congress).

“Tent City!” Everywhere we turn this phrase is on the wind. For those of you who are in the know, you realize that during the first two weeks of April a parcel of property that has been used by the homeless population as a tent city was effectively closed down. The owner of the property has begun to outline a usage plan. All of those who were living there have been given a notice of trespass and a deadline to leave.

While this is not really an uncommon occurrence, the management of this endeavor in Mobile has been somewhat unusual. The Mobile Police Department has taken great pains to ensure that there are resources offered to these residents. From the very beginning, there were meetings with the agencies who work with those persons who live in the area. Everything from Housing First, AltaPointe Health Systems, emergency shelters, and the Delta Dogs project were invited in to the mix to make sure that these residents are cared for responsibly and with respect. Meetings between these service providers and the Mobile Police Department are ongoing.

Tent Cities are generally one of the biggest problems to tackle in homeless services provision. They typically become a refuge for the hardest to place of any homeless population. They also serve to provide companionship and safety for those few individuals who may have chosen to not pursue traditional housing options. While these communities seem foreign to most of us, they truly are a home to those who live in them. They typically come under a great deal of fire in many communities due to the highly visible nature of the homeless persons in them.

I am sad for the persons who are being displaced from our tent city, but I can honestly say that I am proud to live in a community where the police care so deeply for all citizens that they would work so diligently to ensure that services and options are available to those persons who will be displaced by this action. I hope that each of the persons affected is able to find a new, safe and affordable housing option. ❖

Just Because I Love Her So-Acting is Finally Mine


A TALE OF A YOUNG MAN CHASING HIS DREAM IN THEATRE

Wise mentors have advised me to find my true calling, as following my dream, I've heard, would lead to the pursuit of happiness. From the time that I was a little boy, I knew that God had great things in store for me – even if, at first, I wasn't quite sure what those great things were. Like most young boys, I longed to be popular, desperately wanting to just fit in with the cool crowd. Although I imagined that was the normal thing that kids my age did, it didn't take me long to realize that this only left me always searching more. I tried to find solace in sports, but to no avail. Playing sports was not a burden for me because participation in basketball taught me the true meaning of hard work, determination and competitiveness. I tried as hard as I could to forget her. I threw myself into basketball. My life revolved around the game. I tried to convince myself that pursuing her instead of being a Division I basketball star would be the best bet for me. I fooled myself into believing that I didn't love her for two years. By the end of my 10th Grade year, I had lost my passion for basketball so much so that before summer workouts, I left Faith Academy's basketball program altogether. This was the hardest decision of my life, considering the fact that all of the friends I hung out with were on the team. I was a boy then, just realizing the impact that longing to see her and be in her presence again was having on my entire life. I was just becoming a young man; I knew that I would forever regret following my friends' dreams instead of my own just to stay close to them. So I decided to try our relationship again. If only I could find her.

She was enrolled in my 11th Grade History Class. To my surprise, she showed up unexpectedly during a group assignment to develop a script about Civil War slang to perform in class. With just a mere collection of ideas, my group met and decided to employ fresh improvisation versus stale scripting. To my surprise, the students loved it, especially her. I felt like she and I really connected then, and my potential as an actor began to flourish like an oasis in a dry desert. My group's skit was so good that we were chosen to perform for several other class periods. And, to my amazement, she never left my side. My teacher still uses our skit as a model demonstration to inspire subsequent 10th Graders. My life was forever changed, as I knew, for sure, that I had completely given my heart to her. She was my passion.



I decided to bring her home to meet my mom, as any respectful son would do for the girl of his dreams. With my mother and her by my side, I was registered in my first acting camp ever, Camp Shakespeare Extreme, at the Alabama Shakespeare Festival in Montgomery. I must admit that I was a nervous wreck when I started. I was inexperienced and unsure if I could make a serious career with her. She rewarded my faithfulness and love for her with the reassurance that we were meant to be together when I was chosen for the role of Othello. Othello is the protagonist and hero of the story, an eloquent and physically powerful figure, respected by all those around him. Is that the way she now saw me? If so, I had to make it my mission to completely submerge myself into this role. By so doing, I landed a personal invitation to return and audition.

For the first time since I'd met her, at Camp Shakespeare, I was surrounded by kindred spirits, others who truly understood what being in love with her meant to me. I could confide, perform and meet with other actors without her jealousy because she trusted my craft. I accepted my perspective, acknowledge my fears and faced my struggles head on. Everyone I met wanted the exact same thing; we had all met the woman of our dreams in acting. It was an experience that I cherish and will never forget.

After the successful completion of the performance at Camp Shakespeare, I was determined to return to Mobile to prepare myself for the ASF State Youth Theater Troupe. I found that the best preparation for the future was in giving back to my community so I began a mentorship program at my church, Toulminville- Warren Street United Methodist Church.

I chose to use the arts to increase academic success and model exemplary behavior in middle school males through the performance of plays, mimes and steps.

In terms of the ASF State Youth Theater Troup, the lengthy process of acceptance required two auditions. I was selected from more than 100 other teens to be a part of the Troup. On June 10th and 11th at ASF, The Comedy of Errors will be performed publicly. I will be playing the main character Antipholus of Ephesus. As it is a pivotal role in the play, I am really excited and ready to take on the challenge. I know she has my back. I can handle the pressure of the performance. I am the only member of the cast from Mobile.

Because our relationship has grown so fast in such a short period of time, I plan on bringing all of my future characters to life to truly express her beauty to others. After the production of the Comedy of Errors, I will participate in the Pepperdine University Leadership Academy from June 13-17, and the University of Southern California's Youth Think Camp on the campus of USC from June 19-25. And, despite my involvement in such noteworthy organizations, such as the SGA and BETA Club at Faith Academy, but also in the greater Mobile with organizations like the Mobile Kappa League, Culturama, Leadership Mobile, and as an EMHI Bishop State Community College JEM Dual Enrollment Scholar, I know where my heart belongs.

Although I found her, then lost her again...only for her to return... She's now mine, and I'm all hers. I think I'll love her forever.

Acting is everything. ♣

The year 2016 has not been a good one—at least when it comes to losing music legends.

It was bad enough when we lost the likes of Maurice White of Earth, Wind and Fire, David Bowie and Merle Haggard.

But when word was received that Prince died, it struck a blow that caught everyone by surprise.

Much has been made about his health when reports came that his private jet had to make an unscheduled stop in Moline, IL for what was termed as a medical emergency. And one can bet that there will be speculations about the cause of his death for months to come.

Beyond that, though, let’s talk about the legacy he left behind—a legacy that will last for generations to come. The man was a trailblazer, crashing boundaries like nobody’s business. When Prince came on the scene, there were those—myself included—who didn’t know what to make of this guy.



and have all the conveniences of life nearby. No longer will living in the suburbs and shopping at the malls and strip centers be the only viable option for residents.

One of the challenges of bringing businesses and residents back into the city is finding the right balance of old and new. While we wish to have new stores, buildings and amenities, we don't want to turn the unique neighborhoods and historic districts into just another combination of parking lots and businesses that you can find in just about every city in the nation. While we need the big box and chain stores, we don't want them to overwhelm our charming neighborhoods and diminish the flavor that makes the neighborhood desirable to begin with.

A good example is happening in midtown Mobile where developers plan to bring a much-needed Publix grocery store to the intersection of Old Shell and Florida. The initial design for the shopping center has a suburban design that doesn't mesh with the concepts some of the neighborhood advocacy groups have laid out to maintain and enhance the flavor and character of the neighborhoods along Old Shell Road. At the time of this article, the groups and the developers are engaged in dialogue about the design. I'm hopeful that they can come to a compromise that will give both parties what they feel will be best for them and the city.

Even though some areas have been lacking services and amenities for years, we shouldn't settle for less. We should encourage developments that preserve the character and flavor of the community; developments that allow both businesses and neighborhoods the chance to thrive and enhance the quality of life. Yes, this step may be one of the hardest to accomplish but it will be worth it in the long run. ❖

Widespread Panic “Coverless in Mobile”

On a Wednesday night in February, the Spreadheads of Mobile, AL certainly showed their longtime love of Widespread Panic by buying every available ticket for their concert at the Civic Center Theater. The theater is small, holds about 1900 people, and the jubilantly rowdy crowd was looking forward to an intimate close-quarters show, where there wasn't a bad seat in the house. As the band took the stage, John Bell greeted Mobile amidst loud cheering; and with “A of D” and “Holden Oversoul” to start the night it was clear the band would bring plenty of old-school treats to the party.

With a song repertoire as large as Widespread Panic has, it is certain that some setlists are appealing, others are hit-and-miss, and one fan may rejoice at what another fan may brush off. But I do not think I speak just for myself when I say that the 02/17/16 setlist was incredible, well-crafted, and worthy of praise. In fact, at the end of the night we would realize the entire show was comprised of original Widespread Panic songs, not one cover song in the mix, and THAT was an unexpected and much appreciated note of distinction. When “Bear’s Gone Fishin” melted into “Pilgrims” early in the first set, it was like unwrapping a beautiful present



on Christmas day. “You Got Yours” is always a dirty good time, as well as the set-closing “Imitation Leather Shoes”. Every time I hear “Pleas” I’m thrilled, takes me back to my first time listening to Everyday in high school and instantly loving the band. A highlight of the night came when John “JoJo” Hermann played the beautiful piano intro that brought us to “This Part of Town”: I’m sure fans throughout the theater thought fondly of Michael Houser, and I imagine some tears were shed.

The second set opened with the dance-friendly Street Dogs song “Steven’s Cat”. Then to our delight “Little Lily” came out to play and kick off a string of successful segues. From “Hatfield” to “Surprise Valley” to “Tie Your Shoes” back into “Surprise Valley”, the band moved and morphed smoothly, and the crowd followed them on the journey. After a brief breath of air, “Fishwater” led into “Drums” and “Drums & Bass” before circling back around. “Old Joe” and “Blackout Blues” closed the set, and the blues continued to the encore of “Contentment Blues” before a nostalgic “Vacation” bid us all a good night. And I do believe a good night was had by all; everyone I spoke with was in great spirits and grateful to be there! I know I sure was glad to be there, in that small space with friends near and dear, listening to Widespread Panic play their music for our enjoyment, giving us a chance to dance away our mid-week cares, giving us a great night to remember. ♣

Inaugural Okeechobee Festival 2016

In the beginning of March, the Okeechobee Music Festival came roaring through Florida for the first time ever. This was not you're a typical genre specific festival either. Okeechobee did a job well done at pulling together diversities of all kinds of music into one location as one. WIC Income Guidelines Changed

A notice announcing revised Income Eligibility Guidelines for the Women, Infants and Children (WIC) special supplemental nutrition program was published in the Federal Register last month. The adjusted income eligibility guidelines are used by state agencies in determining the income eligibility of persons applying to participate in the WIC program.

The Alabama Department of Public Health will implemented the new guidelines on April 18. State agencies must use the revised income guidelines at the same time they implement revised income eligibility guidelines for the Medicaid program.

On January 25, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) published its annual update of the poverty guidelines [81 FR 4036]. The HHS guidelines are used by a number of Federal programs, including WIC and the Medicaid Program, as the basis for determining and updating program income eligibility limits. To be eligible on the basis of income, applicants' gross income (i.e. before taxes are withheld) must fall at or below 185 percent of the U.S. Poverty Income Guidelines.

* For a pregnant woman, count each unborn baby in the family size.

To be eligible for WIC, the person must be either a pregnant woman, a breastfeeding woman, a woman who just had a baby, or an infant or a child under 5 years of age.

Pregnant women and children 1—5 years old may get milk, eggs, cheese, juice, cereal, whole grain bread or brown rice, beans or peanut butter, and fresh fruits and vegetables. Breastfeeding women may get all these foods plus canned tuna or salmon and extra milk, cheese and eggs. Infants may get infant formula if not fully breastfed, and infant cereal, fruits and vegetables.

The Mobile County Health Department's Office of Nutrition Services manages the local WIC program. A monthly average of 13,203 participants received WIC food instruments during 2015. MCHD estimates \$10,728,387.26 WIC food dollars were spent in Mobile County last year.

To qualify, a person must meet the income guidelines, be a resident of Alabama and have been seen by a health professional at the WIC clinic. For more information, all 251-690-8829 or visit <http://mchd.org> and look for WIC under the "Services" tab. ❖

HUEY P. NEWTON Stageplay Premieres Next Month

Next month, LEGACY 166 will present a dynamic stageplay that will explore the life of a brilliant and controversial figure that highlighted the Civil Rights Movement. The True Story of Huey P. Newton: Revolutionary, Political Activist and PhD features Alton Landry as Newton, Ravyn Otis as Elaine Brown and Raquel Skanes-McCowan as Angela Davis.

Newton graduated from technical school in Oakland, California without knowing how to read. He then taught himself how to read and began to question the things he saw happening in his family and his community. That launched him into his involvement in the civil rights movement as a man that taught himself to read. He read the works of Malcolm X, Mao Zedong, Karl Marx, Vladimir Lenin and others as his political ideology began to take shape.

While a student at Merritt College in Oakland, he met Bobby Seale and together they organized the Black Panther Party for Self Defense in October 1966. Seale became Chairman and Newton became Minister of Defense. Newton learned about black history from Donald Warden, the leader of the party, but later decided that he offered solutions that didn't work. The Party's political goals, including better housing, jobs, and education for African Americans, were documented in their Ten-Point Program. The group believed that violence - or the threat of it - might be needed to bring about social change. They sometimes made news with a show of force, as they did when they entered the California Legislature fully armed in order to protest a gun bill.

Newton and the Panthers started a number of social programs in Oakland, including founding the Oakland Community School, which provided high-level education to 150 children from impoverished urban neighborhoods, the Free Breakfast for Children Program and others that offered dances for teenagers and training in martial arts.

This is a must see stageplay that tells the true story of the man that was Huey P. Newton and not the propaganda used by the FBI and police organizations whose main objective was to destroy the Party by "Any Means Necessary!"




